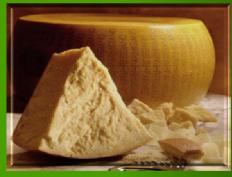

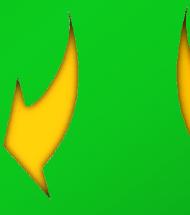








In the post-2013 CAP reforms the EU should provide adequate financial support for the production of high quality food and agriculture

A good product quality policy through:

- · Discretionary labelling
- Country of origin indication for fresh agricultural products
- Place of provenance indication for the raw agricultural material used in "single-ingredient" processed products

- IncreasedTransparency
- Increased traceability
- Help consumers to make well informed purchases
- Make a strong contribution towards the fight against counterfeit goods









Agricultural product quality policies::

- to give full product information to the purchaser and consumer
- to guarantee the purchase of high quality goods in the EU
- to stimulate and educate consumers towards making well informed choices









Compulsory place of provenance labelling for processed products which contain "characteristic" or "distinctive ingredients"

To ensure the consumer is fully aware of the quality of the product being purchased









Maintaining the geographic indications:

Protected Designation of Origin (PDO) Protected Geographical Indication (PGI) Traditional Speciality Guaranteed (TSG)

They represent the bonds products have with specific European regional realities; they represent the traditions, the history, the taste and the unique knowledge that has been handed down through time







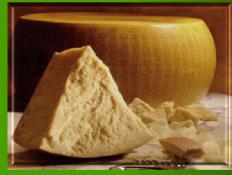


To strengthen the food quality policy:

- •it is necessary to amend the EU's legislation in such a way to enable member states to recognize and enhance the role played by organizations that protect and promote Gis
- a precise Community ruling on the role and definition of consortia is needed
- the protection of recognized products by way of the insertion of compulsory ex officio safeguarding of protected designations
- the economic valorisation of procedures and products with controlled origin
- → a clear definition and recognition of the holders of GI intellectual property rights
- → the development of guidelines regarding the use of GI products as ingredients on the labels of processed goods

• an intensive consumer awareness campaign on behalf of the European Union

•the inclusion in international registries and the international recognition of geographical indications through the WTO system
